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Spelling And Punctuation

Spelling: What are spellings?

Spelling is the process of representing language by means of a writing system.

Spelling is the writing of one or more words with letters. It attempt to transcribe the sound of the language into alphabetric letters.

PHONOLOGY: How words sound.

MORPHEMES: How words are constructed from the meaningful elements.

HOMONYMS: Words that sound similar, but have different meanings and spellings.

A word that is produced the same as another word.

Spelling Rules:

 To spell a short vowel sound, only one letter is needed:

Examples: Combat, shred, exit, hot, super.

 To spell a long sound you usually must add a second vowel, or you may use the consonants Y or W in place of the vowels.

Examples: Reach, loose, soup, seize, sky.

- Almost no English words end in "V" exception: spiv.
- "Q" is always written as "qu". It never stand by itself. Quick, queen, quarrel etc.

• "i" comes before "e" when it is pronounced "ee".

Examples: Brief, field, priest.

• "i" before e except after "c", or when sounding like "a" as in neighbour or weight.

Examples: receive, deceive, celling.

Punctuation:

DEFINITION

 The mark such as full stop, comma and brackets is used in writing to separate sentences and their elements to clarify meaning.

Why do we need punctuation?

 Punctuation allows the auther's writing to be easy to read and understandable for the reader. TYPES OF PUNCTUATION Comma (,)

NEED OF PUNCTUATI ON

Punctuation is the system of signs or symbols given to a reader to reader to show how a sentence is constructed and hoe it should be read.

Punctuation shows how the sentence should be read and makes the meaning clear.

Every sentence should include a capital letter at the start, and a full stop, or exclamation mark or question mark at the end. This basic system indicates that the sentence is complete.
